### Interest Alignment

This serves as a filter to separate what is important to the student and should guide the student actions in their search for a career. It is a way to focus energy, actions and behaviors. Examples may include: Sports, Fashion, Education, Health, Art, or Technology. This helps the student identify industries of interest.

### Skills/Knowledge

This guides a student in work activities that they wish to use in the work environment. This assists the students in identifying appropriate roles. Skills and knowledge are often transferable to multiple industries.

### Work Culture

Work culture plays a role in understanding where a student will do their best work. It is the belief, attitudes and thought processes of the employees. It is the ideologies and principles that guide how the employee experiences the organization.

### Life Needs

Life needs guide choices based on salary, geographic location, health and family. These are a necessary part of students' decisions on where to work.
